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PREFACE

Dr. Ambedkar College of Arts, Commerce and Science, Chandrapur was established by Dr. Babasheb Ambedkar Memorial Society, Chandrapur in June 1970 on Historic place Deeksha Bhoomi where Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar has given Dhamma Diksha to around three lakh peoples on 16th October 1956. The founder of the college was Late Barrister Rajabhau Khobragade, Ex. Deputy Speaker Rajyasabha. He was a true visionary who dreamed to transform this backward region through education.

Our college was assessed and accredited by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore in August, 2004 and awarded by C⁺ Grade on 16th September, 2004. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was established on the recommendations of the Peer Team for enhancing the quality of academics in the college on 2nd July 2011. The college offers many professional and basic programmes from undergraduate to research level in Arts, Commerce and Science faculties. All the programmes are directed towards realization of our Mission and achieving our objectives, in keeping with the values set by Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Memorial Society. After 2014 affiliation of college is changed from RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

I am extremely happy to present this Reaccreditation Report for 2nd Cycle. We, the family members of Dr. Babasheb Ambedkar Memorial Society's, Dr. Ambedkar College of Arts, Commerce and Science, have been in search of excellence in various fields of life. Under the dynamic leadership of Hon'ble Shri Arun Ghotekar and all the member of Dr. Babasheb Ambedkar Memorial Society, Chandrapur, the college has emerged as the premier institute of higher learning of education in eastern Vidarbha for socially and economically backward students. The joint efforts of the teaching and non teaching staff have contributed to the achievement. As a

mark of excellence, the college conducts academic, cultural, sports and other regional state and national level meets.

The Centres for Higher Learning and Research for Electronics and Botany are the only centres in Gondwana University to provide research facility. Some outside research scholars have enrolled at this centre for their research work. Fifteen MRP (Minor Research Project) and one Major research project (Botany) under UGC have been completed but we are aware that this number is inadequate. So we have motivated our teachers to submit more proposals on MRP for the approval. The college has organized ten Conferences/Seminars. Each Department has computer with latest software installed and the latest NMEICT Broadband facility with 10 mbps speed is also provided and whole college is connected with internet and wi-fi communication. College takes special care to organize health related programs especially about prevailing diseases, awareness and counseling programs concerning the girl students. Efforts are also taken to curb eve teasers, ragging, addiction, smoking etc. The college runs girls' and boys' hostel in the campus.

We have organized the university level NSS camp during the previous session. We have rich library with a collection of over 39320 books, Internet facility, 24 hours Reading Room facility for boys and girls separatly. For promoting the intellectual development of students efforts are made to encourage the students to participate in group discussions, paper presentations, model competitions, Arts Gallery, contribution in college magazine, Conferences, Seminars etc. The college has Placement Cell to provide employment opportunity to our students. Ours is the only college in Gondwana University, which organizes blood donation camp every year on 1st January with the help of District Hospital, Chandrapur.

At the end I would like to thank our President Hon'ble Shri Arun Ghotekar, and executive members of governing body. I also appreciate Vice-Principal, Mr. S. D. Beley, IQAC co-ordinator Mr. K. D. Kalaskar and the Steering Committeee co-ordinator Dr. A. S. Lanje and members of steering committee for successful handling of this big task. All concerned faculty members have contributed in preparation of this Re-accreditation report.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Dr. Ambedkar College of Arts, Commerce and Science established in 1970, by late Barrister Rajabhau Khobragade, Ex. Deputy Speaker Rajyasabha is the first college for socially and economically backward students of Chandrapur and Gadchiroli District. The college has the result of a noble and shining vision, and it has to develop this tribal and backward region through education based on human values, social responsibility and patriotism. The founder had to face many problems and difficulties in this path-breaking social experiment and he faced them with an iron will and steely determination. This is still our great strength, and our task today is to continue the vision and mission of the founder by responding to the changing needs. The old hierarchies and rigid structures are fast disappearing and we are today living in a knowledge society. Knowledge is the greatest resource today and applied, skill-based and lifelong learning is the demand of the day.

What the youth today wants more than anything else is quality learning that will help them unleash their innate potentialities, acquire useful skills and become productive, creative and responsible citizens. We are fully prepared for that, and totally committed to educate the young in an exemplary manner, and remain useful to the society by assiduously participating in the arduous task of nation building.

Criterion I : Curricular Aspects

The college is situated on Deekshabhoomi, Chandrapur and this college is affiliated to newly formed Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. The college runs U.G. and P.G courses in Arts, Commerce and Science faculty. Arts and Commerce faculty started in the year 1970. Science faculty started in the year 1991. The institution started research centres in Botany and Electronics departments. Vision and mission of the college is communicated to the students and parents, by the annual prospectus, website, hand bills, induction programs and various meetings organized by the college at the beginning of the session.

For the effective implementation of circular prescribed by the university, college prepares its own teaching plan and daily teaching notes. For effective executions of curriculum, various teaching methods and eresources are regularly used in the class room to create interest among the students. Group discussion and quiz competition are also conducted to involve the student in teaching and learning process. The institution provides aids like projectors and huge number of availability of Indian and foreign author books provides to each course for effective curriculum delivery and for inculcating the knowledge of the subject. The institution organize time to time industrial visit to strengthen the relationship with the corporate sector which will be beneficial for the placement of our students. The institution organizes national level conference to provide a forum for faculties, researchers and students to share their views and ideas on a common platform.

PBAS review committee reviews performance of the teacher who are encouraged to attend the Orientation/Refresher courses and National/ International seminars for their knowledge enhancement. Some of our teachers are on the Board of Studies. They are actively and directly involved in the formation of syllabi. Regular and daily diary is maintained by every teacher to complete syllabus in due course of time.

The Employment and Carrier Guidance Cell of the college actively organizes carrier-oriented programmes. Most of the faculty members of the college are on various curriculum and examination committees of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. Value based education is delivered by the speakers from spiritual communities. The Cells like NCC, NSS and Legal Aid Cell organize value education programmes on cross cutting issues like gender sensitization, climate change, Human Rights and the celebrate the important days to create ethical value among the students.

The college obtains regular feedback from students to enhance the quality of teaching and learning process. The college encourages the students for their active participation in co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities.

Criterion – II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

Teaching, learning and evaluation in the college are student-centered applied and skill-based activity. Our students are mostly from rural and under- privileged section of the society, receive special attention and care in the college for their all-round development. We are able to admit all the applicants for various courses in Arts, Science and Commerce.

The college at the beginning of each session prepares academic calendar, time-table and annual planning of each department and monitors its execution by the Principal and Head of the departments. The college has installed CCTV cameras in some class rooms and all laboratories which are controlled by the Principal for teaching-learning evaluation. The college regularly publishes prospectus which gives detailed information about the admission procedure, fees structure and group combination. Website is also regularly updated by the college, which also gives information about the college and the courses offered by the college. The college strictly follows the rules and regulation given by the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli during admission process. Admission committee is formed for admission process. It provides counseling to students.

The institution adopts different strategies for slow and advanced learners by arranging remedial coaching and revision lectures for slow learners and advanced learners are motivated to participate in various curricular and co- curricular activities. Students' performance is analyzed by class test, seminars, home assignments, model examination and viva- voce. The teachers prepare the monthly teaching plan for each subject and maintain the diary specifying the details of the topics taught in the classroom. The teachers evaluate the students by interacting with them and get the feedback. Along with the lecture method, the teachers follow the interactive method to encourage students to express themselves and to consolidate their understanding of the topic taught in a class room.

The management encourages the faculty members for their professional development by granting study leave, deputing them to conferences, seminars and other training programmes such as refresher courses and orientation programmes. Teachers are also working for their professional development. Above 36% teachers have acquired Ph.D. degree and others are pursuing this research works.

Above 80% admitted students are from SC, ST, NT, SBC, OBC category. The institution runs Carrier Guidance Cell and Employment Cell which helps the students to enter in various jobs. Numbers of students have achieved success in University examination and various competitive examinations some students have also cleared NET, SET and GATE Examinations. We also invite resource persons from outside to guide and motivate students.

Thus, the college tries for excellence through such quality sustenance and enhancement measures. The IQAC committee and Principal take review of all the activities in the college regularly.

Criterion – III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The research scenario in the college is bright. At present two departments in Science faculty have been recognized as centers for higher learning and research. Twelve faculty members have been awarded Ph. D., two faculty members have submitted their thesis and seven faculty members are pursuing Ph. D. Seventeen students are pursuing Ph.D. under the supervision of faculty supervisors. Publications in journals, research paper presentations, writing for general public and other such academic programmes help the faculty to remain at their best. One major research project and fifteen minor research projects have been completed. The college has organized Eleven National Seminars/Conferences/Workshops since 2007. To facilitate research culture in the college, a research committee is formed which helps to researchers for writing research papers and thesis. Students are prepared for Research festival "Avishkar" conducted by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli every year. The college also allows staff to apply for FIP scheme of UGC. So far, four faculty members have availed the benefit of this scheme. A total number of 77 research papers have published by faculty members in Peer reviewed journals and 119 research papers in National/International Conferences have been published during last five years. Similarly 12 books have been authored by our teachers.

Consultancy is an area where the college has to take fresh initiatives. Teachers are invited by other colleges for talks in various activities.

Extension activities are quite productive and socially useful. Various extension programmes are undertaken by the faculty in the area of conservation, community building and social services. The role of N.S.S. and N.C.C. in extension activities is quite remarkable.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is located in the central place of the city where Dr. B. R. Ambedkar has given the Dhamma Deeksha to around three lakhs people in the region on 16th October 1956. This sacred place is famous and known as Deekshabhoomi where large Buddha Vihar is situated. The infrastructure facilities available in the college are excellent. The college has 21348 sq. m. campus area. As it is centrally located, there is a wide scope of verticalhorizontal expansion in Infrastructure. However available infrastructure is utilized to full of its capacity. The college runs in two shifts for this purpose. CCTV Cameras in some class rooms, Corridors and ground are available for security purpose. Administrative Office is fully computerized and online Admission process and other correspondence are being computerized, Free Wi-Fi facility, TV, Xerox centre, LCD projector, cameras are available in the college. Well-equipped science laboratories, Library, big play ground, girls and boys hostel facility, ventilated 32 classrooms, large vehicle parking area, etc. are available.

The college has a big central library with 39,320 books and separate reading rooms for students and teachers. For the maintenance of sensitive equipments 6 Inverters are available in the campus. The college has around 66 computers, 5 Laptops and 44 printers with UPS, scanners, 2 Xerox machines etc. Total campus has internet connectivity of 10 mbps speed and Wi-Fi facility. The college building is given to other external agencies for

conducting many examinations like MPSC, UPSC, Staff Selection, Banking, etc.

Infrastructural facilities are regularly added and maintained. Every department has separate room for Head of the department and other teaching facility other than Staff rooms.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The students admitted in the college are mostly from the society of economically backward and rural background. All information and functioning of the college are informed through the prospectus. Common prospectus is printed for all faculties and contains details about code of conduct, various courses, fee-structure, facilities available, list of various prizes and scholarship available. Admission profile of the students indicates that around 70 % students are girls and 85% students are from backward classes who receive the scholarship. The result profile reveals that passing percentage of college students for last two years is above 60 % which is good in the University.

The college conducts remedial classes for weak students, competitive exams coaching and guidance classes for NET/SLET/MPSC and other competitive examinations. About 20 students have cleared the NET/SLET examination during last five years, and many succeeded in other competitive exams. The college has a Placement Cell that arranges campus interviews and enables several students get placement in various organizations. The college publishes the magazine 'Mukti' every year containing articles, poems and feelings of students. The College has the 'Women Cell' to look after the girls and 'Grievance Redressal Cell' for discipline and anti-raging campaigning.

Students are prepared by proper training for participation in Sports, Cultural activities, Science exhibition, Seminar organized at different level. The students have made us proud by winning several inter-collegiate competitions in debate, drama, dance and other cultural events. Undergraduate students, after final year, opt for post graduation. Around 40% student progresses to PG course. The institution provides all kinds of assistance to students to acquire knowledge and develop skills. The institution aims at all-round personality development of students.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance and leadership of the college is a participatory, confidence, building and dynamic mechanism. The college is governed by governing body of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Memorial Society. Hon'ble Arun Ghotekar, President of Society has keen interest in educational activities of college. He looks satisfied when the objectives for which institution was started are found to be fulfilled. The fatherly attitude of the President towards staff is a special point to put on record.

The Local Management Committee provides general guidelines for creating healthy environment for teaching-learning has got teaching and non teaching staff representation. The meetings are regularly held and the record is kept. The decision-making is fast and every decision has a bearing on the academic progress and administrative efficiency of the institution.

IQAC also monitors and evaluates academic and administrative process. Delegation and decentralization of work is the norm and is achieved through the formation of several committees that look after the various functions of the institution. Feed-back on teacher is analyzed; performancebased self appraisal and calculation of API score are done every year.

Various Committees are formed which contribute in decision making process. Principal has appointed Vice-Principal, IQAC Co-ordinator, NAAC Co-ordinator, Head of the departments to facilitate administration processes.

Effective management of human resources and material management for creating educational opportunities for students and for giving back to society is the central feature of the college governance. This organization hierarchy helps in effective functioning of the college. Everyone in the institution has sense of belonging and a sense of participation in the functioning of this educational institution. Any educational event is well planned before its implementation so that maximum output in term of quality enhancement is achieved.

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

Innovation is certainly the institution's cutting edge which reinforces and sustains 'distinctive environment of excellence' in education. In fact the college gives priority to academic flexibility and scope for innovation. Botany and Electronics research centers were started in the year 2013-2014. To promote research among students, the institution has granted seed money to aspiring students to participate in district, University and state level research convention. There has been a significant rise in research output with increased numbers of publications.

The college has taken many initiatives to make the campus eco-friendly such as energy conservation, plantation, hazardous waste management, etc. efforts are also taken for carbon neutrality.

The college focuses on the extra-curricular activities and research as best practices. Most of the students come from rural background. The college provides them ample opportunities to bring out their best and to develop their personality. The teachers spot their hidden talents, nurture and nourish them. A good number of our athletes got jobs in government sector as well as in private sector.

The number of Ph.D. faculty has gone up to an impressive marks. The number of publications has significantly gone up. The teachers are actively involved in UGC sponsored research projects. The college organizes various talent hunting competitions to harness students' research aptitudes and capabilities.





1.1. Curriculum planning and implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders?

Every institution in the world, however, small or big it may be, has been the result of a vision of its founder member. The visionary who laid the foundation of this institution was a great philanthropist and the touch-bearer of gigantic social revolution in the country. Late Barrister Rajabhabu Khobragade, following the footsteps of his mentor, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar founded Dr. Ambedkar College on Deeksha Boomi on 21st June, 1970. Now, the college stands majestically on the sacred place known as "Deeksha Bhoomi". It had its unique opportunity to be blessed by the solemn presence of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar on 16th Oct, 1956 where there three lakhs of the downtrodden & oppressed people were initiated into the Buddhist fold. Late Barrister Rajabhabu Khobragade who was the Deputy Chairman of Rajjyasabha in 1960, had a purpose to impart high quality education and to create employable graduates. He founded the college to serve especially the needy and the poor Bahujan Samaj students.

The founder had a noble vision to bring in the light of wisdom by removing the darkness of ignorance, and to achieve the all-round development of this backward region. After the sad demise of the founder president Barrister Rajabhabu Khobragade, his mantle fell on Hon'ble Shyam Khobragade and Hon'ble Girish Khobragade respectively. During their tenure the college saw advancement towards growth and progress.

Today, the president of the society is Hon'ble Arun Ghotekar. Since to the last two decade, Hon'ble Arun Ghotekar has stood witness to the immense growth of Dr. Ambedkar College and emerged as its inspiration. His commitment, hard work and driving force made the institution stand at the threshold of multi-layered growth and phenomenal expansion. Under his dynamic leadership the institution is developing steadily. Hon'ble Arun Ghotekar's thought and personality are influenced and chiseled by the ideals of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar. As such the future of this institution is safe, secured and in his hands.

The Principal Dr. Rajesh R. Dahegaonkar is a committed personality. He is influenced by the ideals of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar. Under his valuable guidance we believe and hope that this great institution is working towards the goals set by our great pioneer late Shri Smrutishesh Barrister Rajabhabu Khobragade. Today, the college is known as one of the premier institution of higher learning in the region.

We continue his vision, and our vision statement is as follows:

To kindle the spirit of learning among the youth, to uplift the lives of downtrodden, Minority communities, eradicate their poverty and make them lead a sustainable life, to consistently pursue excellence preserving the tradition of high reputation while meeting the challenges of globalised world.

- To impart universal teaching of Lord Buddha and practise Dr.
 Babasaheb Ambedkar's slogan "Learn, Organise and Agitate."
- Holistic education ensuring all round development of students. Create human capitals, which can be an asset to the nation.

- 1. To preserve human values of equality, freedom, fraternity, amity, compassion and tolerance among students.
- 2. To provide opportunities to premising students from Minority communities who have been denied progress and prestige by religious, social system for many years.
- 3. To create opportunities of education for the poor students of rural

areas.

- 4. To develop the overall personality of students alongwith their educational, physical, mental and intellectual development.
- 5. To inculcate the spirit of service, sense of sacrifice and social commitment among students.
- 6. To exhort the students regularly to give utmost importance to moral principal in their personal and social life.
- To educate the students in order to make them realize the significance of parliamentary democracy, secularism, socialism and supremacy of Indian constitution and the rule of law.
- 8. To enable the students to accept the change in every walk of life and face the challenges that come along with it.
- 9. To develop analytical, intellectual and logical thinking among students.
- 10. To awaken the students to believe it is not caste, religion, sect, language, region or creed but nationalism which is the supreme loyalty of all.
- 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific examples.

For effective implementation of the curriculum, the following action plans are developed and deployed:

- 1) An academic calendar is framed at the beginning of the session.
- 2) The curriculum is split into small units (unitization). A year plan is made, and as far as possible, the teacher adheres to this plan. Special classes are also conducted, if a need arises.
- 3) Unit tests are conducted to evaluate the effectiveness of the implementation.

- 4) Classroom seminars are organized from time to time, in order to add variety and interest to curriculum transmission. This also develops students' communication skills, and thinking power.
- 5) Classroom assignments and project work add a practical dimension to the learning process
- 6) Study tours, industrial visits are also undertaken.
- 7) Innovative teaching methods are also pracitised.
- 8) Wherever possible, the interdisciplinary dimension is explored and explained while teaching a particular topic.

Apart from the above, there are also various action plans and commitments for curriculum transaction with a broader perspective, and social dimension. Various activities are undertaken in this direction.

Blood donation programmes organized by the N.S.S and N.C.C wings of the college are supported by all departments. The students of the various departments with the help of the teachers carry out the blood group testing of donors and the others. The department of zoology organized cancer awareness programme to all the students and faculties

Department of Commerce organized programmes like banking awareness, entrepreneurial skills development by inviting professional from outside. English Department has been making efforts to develop language skills.

These are only a few examples which illustrate the broader dimensions of curriculum implementation. Every department strives hard to implement the curriculum in an applied and socially relevant manner.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and / or Institution) for effectively translating curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Teacher is the focal axis point to translate the curriculum effectively and the college is mindful in providing multi-pronged support to teacher for the same.

At the department level the teachers are provided updated infrastructural supports. The library is updated every year level to provide latest books of the syllabus of each subject for easy reference. The core libraries in most of the departments also have the necessary reference material to supplement the main library of the college.

The teachers chalk out their own methodology of teaching but the college encourages the teachers to attend various workshop on effective teaching conducted by the university and parallel institution elsewhere

The college has constituted PBAS Review committees which revise the PBAS forms and scrutinizes the same to assess the annual performance of the teacher. The self appraisal forms are also submitted by each teacher at the end of the year which is then presented along with the teacher to an academic peer of the same faculty. The academic peer submits report to the principal with suggestion for the teacher. The principal allongwith teachers follows up the same to ensure implementation of the suggested changes. These mechanisms enable the teacher to make suitable changes in the teaching approaches.

Our University organizes various seminars, conferences and workshops on curriculum. The teachers attend the mandatory UGC Refresher courses and Orientation Programmes. They also attend various state level and national international seminars, conferences and workshops. The institution takes special care to depute teachers to such academic programmes without affecting the regular college work. The institution also acquired various teaching aids. The institution also encourages participatory and studentcentered learning practices.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agencies The college is affiliated to the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli which provides the curriculum through the Board of Studies of each faculty. The teachers translate the curriculum according to the syllabi provided by the university.

The college adheres to the demands of social equality and justice while providing global competencies to its graduates while translating the curriculum provided by the subject of science through various experiment, different science project, and Industrial visit by the department of commerce

The institution has provided Wi-Fi facilities to the departments and other aids for effective curriculum delivery. The teachers also familiarize the students with the new developments in the subject. The curriculum transaction is done by explaining its contemporary relevance and practical applications.

The college has yet to start a network of this kind. We are exploring ways and methods for doing this.

The institution and many of its staff members make a significant contribution in the development of the curriculum provided by the university. Many faculty members were on the BoS throughout the year. Almost 90% of the college faculty is involved in paper-setting paper valuation and moderation work in the university .We have to follow the curricula of the University to which we are affiliated. Many faculties of this college are members of the Board of Studies, Gondwana University, Gadchiroli and are engaged in designing the syllabi of university. Dr.V.Y. Gedam from Marathi Department is a member of standing committee of the University and Chairman of Board of Studies in Marathi; Dr. A.S. Lanje from Electronics has been selected to the Board of Studies and is making contribution in curriculum development. Dr. R. R. Dahegaonkar (Botany) Prof. K.D. Kadaskar (Computer Science) Dr. N. S. Ramteke,(Physics) Dr. V. M. Dhakane from Botany, Prof. N.G. Rangari from Electronics, Prof. V.M. Dhadade and Prof. Sanjay D. Beley (Commerce). Prof. S.S. Sadafale (Pali) have been nominated as co-op members of the boards of studies of Gondwana University. We also send the teachers to workshops on syllabus modification and updating. Gondwana University had earlier prescribed books edited by Dr. S.R. Gawali for B.Sc. course. & Dr. V.Y. Gedam for B.A & M.A (Marathi).

Teachers feedback & students feedback are major tool for finding the gap in curriculum which is then conveyed by the college to the Board of Study. The college also seeks feedback on curriculum from the parents and community through the year during extension activities. These suggestions are then forwarded to the university.

The department of the college analyses the other feedback from academic peers, alumni, other faculty. This has encouraged us. Outcome of feedback taken from employers, resource person and participants of conferences, workshop and seminar conducted by the college.

The Self-financing programmes do not differ from the grant-in-aid courses in any significant manner. Admission process and curriculum are the same. The teachers who teach regular courses also teach these programs wherever possible. Contributory lecturers are also appointed for teaching these self-financed programs. These contributory teachers are paid reasonably good salary by the college. Regarding teacher qualification, we are permitted to appoint teachers without NET/SET/PhD qualification for running selffinanced courses; their appointments have to be approved by the university. The fees structure is different, but not very high, and it is affordable to the students.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide the details of such programmes and the beneficiaries.

The college conducts various programs from time to time in the area of personality development, interview techniques, resume writing, etc.

If yes, how does the institution take the advantage of such provision for the benefit of the students? No.

1.3 Curriculum enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by institution to supplement the University's curriculum to ensure that the Academic programmes and Institution's goal and objectives are integrated?

The scope for the college to supplement the University's curriculum is somewhat limited. In order to integrate the academic programs and our goals, we conduct various enrichment programmes at institutional level.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize curriculum to explicitly reflect the experience of the student and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The Employment Cell, Career Guidance Cell, organizes programs through the recruiting companies before the process of recruitment and communicates job offers training workshop through the notice board. In order to integrate the institutions goals university curriculum, its faculties are actively involved in structuring and developing of the curriculum as well as the examination and evaluation process. Class seminar, Group discussion and debates are held on contentions and contemporary issues.

The institution encourages teachers to carry out curriculum transmission by keeping in mind the experiences of students, the knowledge they bring into the classroom, and also the requirements of the employment market.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environment education, Human right, ICT etc, in the curriculum?

The college has initiated efforts to integrate cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environment education, Human right, etc in the curriculum in a modest and concerted manner. The teachers who are in the Board of Studies have begun working in this direction. Needless to mention, it can be done only at a slow but steady pace since curriculum is framed at the University level.

- The Women Development Cell of the college is involved in Gender Sensitization of the students while women empowerment Cell consist conducts awareness programme for sensitive girl students, women health. Save the girl child, gender equality and gender sensitization are the activities in the college.
- 2) The university has mandated the incursion of environment studies in the second year of all under graduate courses.
- 3) Tree plantation programme by NSS & NCC.

- 4) Students opting for Botany help in maintenance of the college botanical garden.
- 5) In order to equip the students with global competences, the college has included and integrated the trying to use ICT.
- 6) Entrance campus is enabled with Wi-Fi connectivity and free internet.
- 7) All departments are equipped with computers.

Gender issues, climate change, human right, ICT, etc. have found a place in the curriculum of the respective subjects like Sociology, Geography, Political Science, Chemistry etc. Some of our teachers have made contributions by giving necessary input, feedback, etc.

More such efforts will be made by the college in the future in order to enrich the curriculum by incorporating the new demands and exigencies of the society. The institution is fully aware of the urgent need to update the curriculum for the creation of a sustainable and eco-friendly society with gender and social equity along with technological advancement. We are working hard towards this in the area of curriculum expansion.

1.3.4 What is the various value added courses/ enrichment programme offered to ensure holistic development of the students?

- Moral and ethical values
- Employable and life skills
- Better carrier options
- Community orientation

The college lays great emphasis on the holistic development of students so that they are fully prepared to face life and pursue their career while being sensitive to moral values, social responsibility and maintaining healthy relationship. To inculcate such value system among the students, the college grooms them by providing them with sound moral value education through forums such as the NCC, NSS, Legal Aid Cell, Women Development Cell and various such group activities The college organizes various programmes to inculcate moral and ethical values among the students, teachers and parents. Dr. Babsaheb Ambedkar Memorial Society organizes Deeskha Samaranbha every year on Oct, 15th & 16th to enlighten staff, students and the general public. Yoga class is also organized in the college by the physical education department every year in the month of June.

The college regularly invites eminent citizens from society particularly Buddhist monk on the day of Buddha Jayanti and Dr. Ambedkar Jayanti. The students regularly participate in all spiritual events and camp at Deekha Bhoomi.

The NSS & NCC of the college are involved in a host of social outreach activities throughout the year in which a large number of students actively participate and are involved in a devoted manner and deal with varied social issues like health, cleanliness, environment and literacy.

The college is involved in dealing with social issues of substance like saving the girl child and literacy awareness. In all these activities students personally visit slums to create awareness and provide help services. While catering to gender issues the college has made it a point to visit the various slums areas. Career-oriented programmes area held by each department. Successful Alumni are invited to deliver talks, guide & interact with students.

The teacher of every department also informs the students about various career options in the various fields. Career option workshops are also conducted by some department like Zoology, Commerce etc. Under the auspices of NSS and other wings of the College, various communites directed programmes are organized.

1.3.5 Cting few examples enumerate on the extent of the use of the feedback from stake holder in enriching the curriculum.

We take the feedback of the students, alumni, parents, employers and community from time to time through various methods. We organize the annual meeting with the alumni of this college along with the parents. The students are given full freedom to give their feedback on curriculum along with other aspects that concern them.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of the enrichment programme.

This is done by observing and evaluating students' overall performance, behavioral patterns, and performance at various extracurricular activities, and community service.

1.4 Feedback system

1.4.1 What are the contribution of the institution in the designing and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Some of the faculties are the BOS members and contributes in the designing and developments of the curriculam prepared by the University. Normally the syllabus is revised every three year by the university but in the year 2012-13 Gondwana University introduced the Credit Based System (CBS) and semester pattern at UG and PG level.

The institution sanctions duty leave to the faculty members to attend various seminars and workshops on curriculum development and to make paper presentations. The institution also motivates the faculty to update their knowledge, and to give the necessary feedback to the Board of Studies regarding the current requirements. The college library subscribes to a good number of journals and periodicals.

Recently our college has organized National Conference on the occasion of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar's 125th birth Anniversary and University level workshop with collaboration of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Gondwana University Teacher Association on curriculum development for teachers in APIS.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the universities and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing the changes/ new programme. The college annually and sometime bi-annually takes feedback from students, academic employer, and alumni, community member and visiting expert. The feedback is analyzed by the college. The suggestions are communicate to the university in the Board of study meetings The College consider the students suggestion and introduce various inreachment programmes. An example on this issue is the introduction of the research center of Electronic & Botany approved by the Gondwana University.

Feedback from employers is relevant to the employability attributes of our graduate and these are taken during their visit to the College to deliver talks and interactions with students. Outcome of his feedback is the feature of Personality Development Programmes of Employment cell, Carrier Guidence Cell. The Commerce department has conducted group discussion & interview skill on the suggestion given by employers.

Alumni feedback and feedback from guests' faculty visiting the college is duly noted feedback from parents and other community members is kept in mind while designing Planners.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/ courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was rational for introducing the new courses/ programme?

Center for Higher Learning and Research in the subject Botany and Electronics is recognized by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli from 2014.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Publicity:

The details, necessary regarding the college and its admission procedure are published every year in the prospectus. The publicity is done by local cable network, local newspaper, hoardings at main roads, mouth publicity by our students. As our College runs under graduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) courses, prospectuses are provided for undergraduate and post graduate streams.

Our college forms admission committees every year, to facilitate admission process.

Being a backward region students rarely apply through internet facility, although admission procedure in detail is displayed on the homepage of College website. The details of available courses are also displayed and updated by new information and changes if any.

Transparency:

Transparency is maintained by displaying the list of admitted students along with the marks in the qualifying examination in case the number of applicants outnumbers the available seats. The admission committee is fully vigilant and alert to the need for total transparency in the process. Detail fee structure is mentioned in the college prospectus. The fees receipts are given immediately on payment of the fees.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex.

Just after the H.S.S.C results, distribution of prospectus begin and duly filled in application forms are received by the admission committee, till the last date. Our admission process is of first come first serve basis, spot admissions are also given. Since it is a backward region, all the applicants are given admission for the respective courses. For P.G. courses, certain weightage is also given for interview performance though marks obtained for the qualifying exam is the main criterion. The institution follows rules and regulation prescribed by the university regarding the admission to various courses.

The minimum percentage required at entry level is 35% in qualifying examination. Since the admissions are given on first come first served basis we don't maintain a comparative record with other colleges

- No special preference is given to girl students as such but female students outnumber than male students in many courses. Also in some of the postgraduate courses like Botany, Zoology and Marathi we have 90% girl students.

- For economically weaker and minority community students, government provides relaxation of tuition fees; also scholarship is available for some backward section students. Our College comes in minority community class given by UGC. The first preference is given to minority community students.

Number of students in UG has decreased over the years. A possible reason for this may be the increase in of undergraduate colleges and technical institutions. Admission committee has started counseling students for improvement of admissions.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

At present, we have very few differently-able students. There Classes are conducted at ground floor and special attention is given. In the past, there was a visually – challenged girl student whose special needs were taken care of by the college in the right earnest. In the new constructions, there is provision for ramps. The college is very sensitive to the differently-able students, and will encourage such students to take admission in our college. There is provision in University examination rules to allot extra time for handicapped students or to allow writer during examination, on producing authentic certificate. Special seating arrangement is made for such students.

The institution as such does not have a scheme to assess students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the program, but informally it is done.

For the first year students of all the streams, the initial classes are more of like orientation programmes, which are meant to acquaint them with the college atmosphere, examination and evaluation process, extracurricular and co-curricular activities etc. Their marks in the previous qualifying exam and their performance in the initial classes reveal to some extent the knowledge and skills of the students. Thus the initial classes are some sort of programmes for assessing the students' knowledge and skills before the commencement of their programmes.

From this assessment, the slow learners are given special attention while the advanced learners are encouraged to learn more on their own using Library and Internet facilities and additional support of the teachers. Our institution conducts remedial classes for the slow learners and students of minority groups as per UGC scheme to solve their queries / problems and to enhance their skill and competence.

The college does not specifically provide bridge courses but the faculty members take care of the students' knowledge to bridge the gap which the student has before entering a specific course.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The sensitizing programmes are conducted generally by N.S.S or Women Cell. Through these programmes the staff and the students are made aware of the gender issues and environmental challenges. Women Cell organized a workshop on "Women's Rights and Concerning Laws", a sort of gender sensitization programme. Programmes on environmental issues are generally conducted during N.S.S camp in every year. Also our College organized **'Sadbhavana Pandharwada'** to awareness of the gender issue.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are given special assignments and encouraged to learn more on their own by using library and internet. College provides study rooms to students for 24 hours. They are given extra time to know their talents. Further advanced learners are motivated for MPSC, UPSC, and other competitive Exams.

The advanced learners are identified from following data:

- Percentage of marks obtained in the last qualifying exam.
- Interaction with the students during initial classes.
- During discussion, question and Answer and class tests.

The free coaching classes were conducted every Sunday in our college premises as a result of which following students are working in different private and government sectors.

The advanced learners are encouraged to learn more, know more in the advancements in their respective fields etc. They are challenged and encouraged to walk an extra mile.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The departments of our institution prepare result analysis of students soon after the announcement of result by the university. This helps the staff to collect all the data and information regarding the progress of the students. Staff members use this data to find out slow learners and train them which helps to reduce the dropout rate.

Under the UGC XIth Plan Scheme, the college has been sanctioned financial assistance to run coaching and guidance classes for SC/ST/OBC and minority students. The college also conducts remedial coaching classes. Very few physically challenged students have sought admission in our college in years.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

In the beginning of every academic year, our college prepares an Academic Calendar prior to the commencement of admissions in consultation with Principal and Heads of the departments. The same academic calendar is published in the college prospectus before the beginning of every session. All the teachers are advised to prepare their teaching plan at the beginning of year.

The Vice-Principal of the college, after interacting with every Head of the department, makes a detailed time-table for all the departments. A draft of time-table is sent to all the H.O.D.s and teachers concerned to suggest any changes if needed.

Evaluation of the students is being done by teachers, after 1st and 2nd Semester model exams at the college level. The teacher evaluates students in the papers he/she has taught. After examination their mark sheets are maintained for further use. Annual examination is conducted by the University. Time-table is displayed on the notice board after it is sent by University to the Colleges. Syllabus and paper pattern is communicated to the students well in advance.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

- A) IQAC collects information on a regular basis and compiles reports. On the basis of the report the committee prepares plans, both orally and in writing and conveys them to the staff to implement. IQAC conducts meetings with students council and teaching staff to know their difficulties, and prepares plan to resolve them.
- B) The IQAC encourages faculty members to participate in various conferences, seminars and workshops organized at regional, state / national and international level.
- C) From time to time, different Faculty development programmes, such as seminars and conferences are organized by the departments. For example, during the last 5 years, 6 departments have organized state / national level conferences and during the year 2007 to 2011 about 15 Minor

Research Project are completed by staff members. One of the Major Research Projects is completed by our Principal Dr. R. R. Dahegaonkar.

- D) With the help of IQAC, the students' council brings to the notice of the Principal their perception and also suggest steps that will lead to the improvement of the overall quality of the teaching- learning process.

 - Departmental libraries are properly maintained with optimum utilization.
 - Is trying to introduce a system of evaluation of the teachers by students.
 - Is trying to introduce a system of evaluation of students by taking unit tests.
- 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Student-centered learning which means putting students first, is focused on the students' needs abilities, interests, and learning styles with the teacher as a facilitator of learning. Student-centered learning requires students to be active, responsible participants in their own learning. Therefore our institution encourages a participatory learning activity like presentation at seminars and assignments/project work, collection of information from internet and other reference books. The departments like Science, Commerce and Geography allot project work at undergraduate level, where self learning by students is the main objective. Post graduate courses in some subjects like Electronics, Botany, Zoology, and M.Com have long term projects in their syllabus. Such activities contribute to self management of knowledge development, skill formation in the students and helps them to become confident and self reliant. Science and Arts exhibition during cultural gathering gives a platform to their creativity. The college magazine is also a platform for the students to develop independent thinking and self-expression.

<u>Interactive Learning</u>: The new information technology is widely used in the teaching learning process. Our institution allows the use of modern multimedia teaching aids like LCD, OHP, PPT models and computer systems in the class room instructions as well as other student learning experiences to some extent, although lecture method predominates. The students are also encouraged to use computer software packages and internet to acquire data.

<u>Collaborative learning</u>: To develop the skill of collaborative learning students are given group activities like projects, collection of information from internet and so on. With this skill learners have the opportunity to converse with peers, present and defend ideas and be actively engaged. The study tours are carried out by almost all departments.

Independent Learning: To develop the skill of independent learning our teachers motivate students to learn independently by providing learners with resource materials, giving them feedback on their progress and thus encourage them to plot their own path of growth. Teachers act as facilitators.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The faculty of this institution is aware of the fact that "Transferring knowledge to students is one thing - teaching them to question what they have just learned is a wholly different challenge". So our faculty has adopted teaching methods that can nurture critical thinking among students. Critical thinking is developed through questioning technique and debates. Students are

encouraged to ask "why?" about everything they learn which enables them to connect their classroom experience to the real world. Debate is a healthy way to get students to consider other perspectives on a subject and come up with creative ways to justify their own arguments, so debating is encouraged.

Our institution has several associations which conduct several programs such as Essay writing, General Knowledge Competition, Debate Competition, Elocution Competition, Quiz Competition etc. throughout the academic year.

Our institution aims to improve conceptual understanding and develop scientific aptitude amongst students by providing hands-on learning experimental tools. We have 08 spacious and well equipped laboratories. The faculty of science and those programs having practical work like Geography helps students to understand a concept by 'OBSERVE, EXPLORE & REFLECT' methodology, which would help students to nurture their scientific aptitude.

This methodology enables students to design their own learning process. They learn by reflecting on their experiences which makes them the masters of their own learning process. When in classroom, the lecturer helps create situations where the students feel confident to question and reflect on their learning.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Faculty uses teaching material from open educational resources if needed for effective teaching.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The students and the faculty keep pace with recent developments in their disciplines by participating in National/International Seminars /Workshops/Symposiums/ Summer Schools/Refresher Courses /Internet browsing and interactions with experts, by using research journals and latest reference books. Our College has a rich library with computer and internet facility, which informally acts as e-library. College subscribes to a number of journals and magazines for all the subjects concerned.

College encourages students to read the magazines, journals and latest information available on the internet. The students are encouraged to conduct seminars on recent developments which mutually benefit the students as well as the faculty. The College organizes State/National level Seminars/Workshops etc. from time to time.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The aim of the college is to develop and cultivate ideal citizenship among the students. For improving the academic standards of students they are encouraged to undertake seminars, study tour, projects and assignments. The College promotes the students to undertake the activities like Blood Donation Camp, Cultural Programs, Environment Awareness Campaigns, AIDS Awareness Seminar, Planting Trees, the Science Exhibition (Avishkar). Activities like four Days College Gathering (Sports and Cultural) seek to promote all round development of the students. Free coaching for NET/ SET, MPSC and other competitive examinations has resulted in adding value to the education.

Students publish their thoughts, articles and poems in the college magazine 'MUKTI' published annually. This has resulted in encouragement to their writing aspirations and has added value to their efforts.

A very active NSS unit of the college has also resulted in adding value to the education that the students receive. One of the NSS students Mr. Praful Durge participated in RD Parade, Delhi.

Our students were winners in various sports events in the year 2011-2012, Mr. Premraj D. Gawande and Miss. Jainab Babar Pathan played in International Hockey Team (Malaysia City). In December 2011, Mr. Prashant Shinde (Power lifting) represented in Inter University Tournament conducted **by** RTM Nagpur University and District level tournament, Mr. Govinda Kakda (Boxing) won in Inter University Tournament conducted by in RTM Nagpur University and Mr. Arpan Kothare (Power lifting) represented in District Level and State Level.

In the year 2012-2013 Mr. Premraj D. Gawande played in International Hockey Team (Malaysia City) Four Players Suraj S. Patil, Bablu V. Khankure, Swapnil S. Totade and Sohel Khan (Handball) won championship of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, Mr. Arpan Kothare secured 3rd position in Weight Lifting Inter-College Tournament held in Nagpur University. Volleyball teams were won in Inter-College tournament in Gondwana University, Cricket teams were won in Inter-College tournament in Gondwana University.

Five students Premraj Gawande, Badal Upare, Bablu Khankhure, Shiba Khan and Jainab Pathan were participated in Sr. National level Indoor Hockey Game, Nasik.

In the year 2013-14 Rabbi Team won in Inter State Tournament secured 1st position in Inter-College Handball Tournament, conducted by Gondwana University. Ball Badminton team stood Runner - up in Inter-College Tournament in Gondwana University and Cross Country Team won championship in Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

In the Year 2014-15, the college Kabaddi team won championship. The College team remained at 2nd position in Cross country, Netball, Hockey, Boxing game. Secured 3rd position in Ball Badminton tournament in Gondwana University, 23 Students were participated in All India West Zone champions conducted by Gondwana University Gadchiroli.

In the year 2015-16, the College teams won championship in Cross country, Circle Kabaddi, Weight Lifting and Athletics. 2nd position in Indoor Hockey and 3rd position in Handball tournament conducted by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. Thus the success achieved by the college students on

all fronts is largely due to the special efforts of the institution to add value to the quality enhancement of students.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The College has made several efforts to bring innovation in teachinglearning process. Lecture method is basically used to introduce the topic based theories, concept elaboration and depth of subject. Along with conventional lecture methods, students' participation in seminars, discussions, group discussion, question answers, case studies are encouraged. Further they are exposed to facilities like LCD projector, PPT in teaching learning method. This has enabled the students to keep pace with the modern technology development and to make them competent. Some of the course programmes have study tours, practical sessions, projects and field works, besides the usual class room interactions (Botany, Zoology, Geography, Commerce, Marathi, Economics, and History etc).

In many of PG Departments (Physics, Zoology, Electronics, Botany, Chemistry and Commerce etc) seminar is a compulsory activity. Some departments assign projects (theoretical as well as experimental) at undergraduate as well as postgraduate levels.

The following efforts are made by our institution:

- 1. A well enriched library facility is made available, with latest journals and related Magazines.
- 2. Provision of computer/internet facility to teachers.
- 3. Organization of State/National level Seminar/Conferences
- 4. Training the faculty in the latest trends/techniques in their fields and the willingness of the management to provide financial help for this purpose.

Impact: The impact has been positive. The students have on the whole become independent and confident learners. They explore library and other

learning resources more frequently and independently. Our students stood in merit list in the university examinations.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Our central library is a vast store of standard books and provides reading room for 24 hours for boys and girls separately. The library staff is there to help students, in case they have problems for locating books in the library. All the teachers use reference books and other reading material from the library to make their teaching effective. The central library subscribes to several national dailies, journals and magazines for the users. The creation of departmental libraries in all major departments has further broadened students' access to books. All these practices together result in the optimum use of books. Thus the library resources effectively enhance teaching-learning process.

No, the institution does not face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. If curriculum is not completed the some faculties are conducted extra classes and many times engage off periods.

Our faculty prepares teaching plan well before the commencement of classes which helps in the completion of curriculum within time, also for any reason if they fail to complete it within the planned time frame, faculty is always ready to work extra time to complete the syllabus.

The college conducts term exams in a time bound way. Class tests are also conducted by faculty members. From these results students are evaluated. In science section laboratory performance and regularity are also taken into consideration to evaluate the students and to monitor their performance and progress. The results of test are announced.

Parent teacher association meetings help to inform parents about the progress of their wards. If a student continuously remains absent, a letter is sent to inform them of the problem. Telephonic communication is also preferred. Students are free to express their grievances to the concerned teachers. If any error is found, it is rectified. Counseling of students is done to improve their performance.

- Considerably enriched library with UGC funding; e-journals have been subscribed, internet facilities are provided.
- Maximum assistance to teachers doing M. Phil and Ph.D.
- Good performance is always recognized and appreciated.

To recharge teachers they are sent for attending refresher and orientation courses (refer to answer 2.4.3). They are also encouraged to attend conferences/seminars and write papers for publication. The teachers, whose papers are accepted /invited for oral, poster presentations, are deputed to participate and present their research papers in the national/ international conferences / seminars/workshops. Teachers are also deputed for in service training to gain knowledge in the emerging fields. The departments are encouraged by our management to organize national/international conferences. In the last five years one national level seminar/conferences have been organized by the college. The college intends to start publication of an interdisciplinary academic journal very soon. Teachers are encouraged to undertake minor/major research projects. The College has also sanctioned FIP leave for some faculties (Dr. A. S. Lanje, Dr. V. P. Dakhane, Dr. P. M. Shende, and Dr. V.Y. Gedam) to carry out research. The management also provides monetary support whenever required for such works.

The evaluation methods are not as such communicated to the students. During the reopening days fresh students are told about teaching-learning process, laboratory and library facilities and the evaluation techniques. Students' interaction, counseling with teachers, act as means for proper communication to students on "Evaluation system".

The major reform implemented by the affiliating university is with respect to the early declaration of the results. The faculty has helped the University by giving all possible support in valuation, making infrastructure available for centre of examination as also in quick moderation and tabulation of results. For the past several years, the results have been declared in a timebound fashion helping the students.

The university has introduced semester pattern from academic year (2012-13), with internal assessment marks, project work, etc. This will be a major reform on the part of the affiliating university.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

In case of Formative assessment teachers individually determine it through their teaching methods by asking questions and knowing their difficulties. This type of assessment helps the teacher to identify problem areas which need to be clarified or re-taught. It helps our faculty to ascertain whether curriculum or learning activities need to be modified during class session or before the next class meets.

As we know that summative assessment is cumulative in nature which is used to determine whether students have met the course goals or student learning outcomes at the end of a course or program. During the course, term exams and unit tests are conducted to evaluate the students. As explained above in earlier questions our college conducts result analysis after declaration of university results, which helps to know the learning outcomes of the final year students. And for F.Y and S.Y UG students this helps to improve their results and progress.

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

As described in 2.3.11 the progress of the students is evaluated and communicated:

1. The student's performance for F.Y. and S.Y. UG classes is monitored by terminal model examinations conducted by the college and semester wise University exams.

2. University Practical examinations are conducted at the end of the every semester.

3. The terminal model examination papers are evaluated by the concerned faculty and its result is maintained and the students are duly informed of the results.

4. The university exam papers are assessed by the university by centralized assessment.

5. The results are declared by the University and mark sheets are issued to students/parents.

6. Examination plan is declared by University and is updated on University Website.

7. Results are declared on University web site for students and parents. Mark lists are sent to colleges.

8. The overall performance of the students throughout the year is judged by tests, Presentation, Assignment, viva and attendance in all subjects.

9. We also conduct parent-teacher meetings once a year where parents are informed about students' progress and attendance.

The university introduced semester pattern from academic year (2012-13), with internal assessment marks, project work, etc. This is a major reform on the part of the affiliating university.

2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Assignment and seminars of the students are conducted by the teachers and on the basis of which the student progress is noted down. Faculty determines the student progress and by conducting Unit Test and Model test as Summative assessment. After analysis we pick the good student and provide them guidelines which help them to score not only good marks but also secure the position in the University ranks.

To measure the students 'achievement the institution conducts model exam before university exam. The 5 marks are for model exam and 5 marks for assignment and for attendance 5 marks and participation in departmental activities 5 marks are kept. A student should get a pass if he gets 10 marks out of 20 in internals. Like that in external examinations a student should get minimum mark for a passing and overall 35% in UG and 40% in PG is required to clear the subject/paper.

Yes, the institution on the whole and individual teachers in particular uses evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. Slow learners are given special coaching and guidance. Bright students are guided for higher achievements.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Parent- teacher association meetings help to inform parents about the progress of their wards. If a student continuously remains absent, a letter is sent to inform them of the problem. The Telephonic communication is also preferred. The students and the parents are free to discuss their grievances with the concerned teachers and the Principal. If any error is found, it is rectified. Counseling of students is done to improve their performance. At the university level,

• If students are not satisfied with the evaluation of any subject, they can apply for verification of marks,

within 7-10 days after the declaration of the result.

- Students can even apply for photocopy of assessed answer paper within Seven (as per prescribed rules) days of declaration of the result. If he/she is not satisfied with the assessment, he/she can apply for reassessment of that answer paper after paying required fees as per the rules of concerned university.
- For any grievance regarding evaluation, the students or the parents are free to meet the Principal.

• As per the request of the student the examination committee verifies the marks.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, The College has clearly stated its vision, mission and objective and is fully committed to them. The college aims at producing very confident learners with knowledge, skill, attitudes and values, which enhance their employability and progression opportunities. The learning outcomes are given in the prospectus. The Principal organizes a general meeting at the beginning of the academic year and informs the staff about the learning outcomes.

Every programme has its own learning outcomes set out by university itself as preface to the syllabus. The staff members are therefore well informed of these outcomes before they commence teaching. The learning outcomes of each subject are also informed to the students by the faculties.

2.6.2 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The following structure is used to achieve the intended learning outcomes:

1) Student assessment is usually done by formative and summative methods. (Unit tests, term exams, practical exams. seminars, and knowing their university results)

2) From the staff view point following questions are considered:-

- What teaching and learning methods are appropriate?
- How can students' learning be assessed?

3) The faculty is asked to keep in mind the overall learning outcome and prepare individual course learning outcome.

2.6.3 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

Following initiatives are taken up:-

- 1) The college organizes seminars for students explaining job relevance to the students.
- 2) The faculty always encourages them to learn more through internet and research journals so that they become aware of new and innovative knowledge of their subjects. As explained in Q.2.3.4 students are induced with scientific temper so that after post graduation they move on for research in their respective field.
- 3) The college has a placement cell that takes all efforts to connect with prospective employers, invite them for campus interviews, and hold seminars and talks.

4) Commerce Department conducts various programmes by inviting businessmen, LIC Counselor and other experts in the field of entrepreneurship.

2.6.4 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Every year, the college collects and analyzes subject wise data on students learning outcomes for planning. We collect and analyze data on learning outcomes by knowing their final year data results and by knowing how they do in and after their PG or their jobs. We take feedback from alumni and try to implement changes in our teaching and learning process. Considering the backwardness of this and the surrounding regions we feel that though the outcomes are not achieved to an exemplary level but to some extent they are satisfactory.

- Initiatives measures taken up to enhance social and economic relevance of the courses offered.
- The college has established the Career Guidance and Placement Cell for quality job and entrepreneurship.
- The students are encouraged to participate in "Avishkar" organized by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.
- Faculty members maintain the records of university exam.
- Internal and External Assessment (Result Analysis)
- Feedback from students.

2.6.5 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes.

. We try to keep track of our students' performance and achievements in various fields through alumni, employers, and even general public. To monitor achievement of learning outcomes our institution holds meetings of the staff and with the management from time to time. And to ensure its achievement following steps are taken:

Dr. A. S. Lanje, Dr. S. R. Gawali, Dr. D. M. Pimpalshende and Mr. G. G. Ramteke carried out their measurement (weighing) in Chemistry, Botany and Zoology Laboratory. Mr. G. G. Ramteke and Mr. N. C. Das are using the facilities in Electronics Department. The chemicals required for the research work are taken from Chemistry Department. All the researchers including students take help of Computers available in the Computer Science Department. The Department of Zoology, Botany, Electronics and Chemistry share mutual facilities and expertise which resultes into maximum research output.

Major research instruments available in laboratory are as follows:

Zoology-Incubator, Spectrophotometer, Autoclave, pH meter, Soil testing kit, Digital balance, Laminar Air-Flow. etc.

Chemistry-Single distillation apparatus, Single pan Electronics balance, UV-visible-Spectrophotometer, Hot plate, Shaking machine, Digital balance, Oven, Water and Soil testing kits, vaccum filteration pump, pH-Meter, Waterbath, Polarimeter, etc.

Electronics- Spectrophotometer, Three CROs, LCR meter, Microwave oven, R F generator, Furnaces(1500°C), Microprocessor and Microcontroller Kits, Digital balance, Single pan Electronics balance, Oil Bath, Nanovoltmeter, Digital Storage oscilloscope etc.

Physics- Two CRO, LCR meter, LCD Projector, Microwave Oven.

The central library is enriched with research journals / periodicals Each departmental library contains relevant research literature including Thesis, Conference proceeding and reference books, etc.

The college follows a policy of upgrading the infrastructure in the premises to facilitate the environment for effective teaching and learning. The college has been making enhancement in the existing infrastructure as per requirements to meet the academic needs with the help of the management and additional assistance recieved from UGC, government and other agencies. The suggestions made by the Principal for extension, additions, up-gradation of infrastructure are put before the Local Management Committee (LMC), thereafter requisite decisions for the purchase, extension, addition and modification of existing infrastructure are executed. As such, we have been able to acquire and expand infrastructural facilities in tune with our development.

Administrative office is fully online computerized and admission process is followed, correspondence with external media, publication of various lists, reports, certificates, identity cards, results etc. are being computerized.Wi-Fi facility is made available to everyone in the campus. Xerox centre for students and staff is available in the college campus.

Equipment for teaching, learning and research: Computers with internet facility is provided to each department, laptops are provided to some of the faculty. LCD and overhead projectors are used as per requirement. Electronics, Botany, Zoology and Chemistry Departments are equipped with UV – Visible spectrometers to be utilized in research work.

Library: Central library mentains a good number of books and journals. A separate reading room is made available to boys and girls and also for the faculty.

Power supply: 5 Inverters (1.5 KVA) and one 2.6 KVA in various departments.

b. Extra-curricular activities: Sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, N.S.S., N.C.C., cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

Power-point presentations by the students, virtual learning, use of on-line resources, etc. have placed the students almost at the centre of teaching-learning experience and have made them equipped with the latest tools and technologies utilized in the modern era.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infra-structure, facilities and equipments of the college?

The institute hires external services for repair and maintenance of infra-structure facilities and equipments of the college. The college recruits a person to take care of the electric supply and a few electrical gadgets as well as to look after the proper functioning of the inverter as and when required. The college teaching and non-teaching staff maintains the equipments. Other infrastructure and facilities are maintained and looked after by the staff recruited for the same such as laboratory attendant for laboratory work, library attendant for library work, sanitary attendant for sanitary work, etc.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute takes up calibration and other precision measures for equipment/instruments?

The institute takes up calibration and other precision measures for equipments or instruments regularly. For this purpose, the equipments and other instruments are checked regularly and used accordingly. If any problem comes in the equipment or instrument, then these are repaired immediately with the help experts. Regular checking of the functionality of these equipments and instruments is done by the staff members. In this way, the institute takes up calibration and other precision measures for equipments and instruments.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, up keep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (Voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

For the maintenance of sensitive equipments one 2.6 KV inverter and five 1.5 KV inverters have been installed to tide over the load shedding problem and provide uninterrupted power supply to examination control room, office and laboratories. So we have an

inverter back-up and the institution also has installed MCBs'and other required electrical accessories wherever required which check the electrical fluctuations. In this way, the college takes major step for location, up keep and maintenance of the sensitive equipment.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for -?

a) Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:

(i) Students are made aware regarding various types of available

scholarships.

- (ii) Remedial classes are arranged for SC, ST, OBC and economically deprived students.
- (iii) Extra time is given by the faculty for guiding them according to their needs.

- c) Overseas Students: At present, the college does not have students from overseas and abroad.
- d) Students to participate in various competitions/National and International: All faculties of the institute encourage and motivate the students for participating in various competitions. The college provides special training and guidance for students to participate in Regional/ State/National / International level competitions. The college also bears the expenses of some selected students.
- e) Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.: There is no special unit of medical treatment and assistance in the college. Though there is no health centre in the campus, the college is in a position to provide immediate medical assistance to students in case of an emergency. The arrangement of First-aid box is made available in the department of physical education.

- **f)** Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams: Institution provides coaching for MPSC and other competitive examinations.
- g) Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,): Students are motivated to speak in English. Facilities like computer lab and internet are made available in the college for students to develop spoken English skills; computer literacy, etc.
- h) Support for "slow learners": Special attentions are given towards the slow learners. Teachers provide them extra time and also encourage them to learn at their own pace. We also try to spot their other hidden talents and provide opportunities to develop them.
- i) Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/business house etc.: Invited talks of Resource persons from higher learning, banking, corporate and business sectors are arranged in the college for the exposure and interaction of students. The college also arranges industrial visit and study tours. In regular teaching also, teachers try to expose the world outside the classroom to create the interest in higher learning and corporate life education.
- **j) Publication of student magazines:** The college magazine '**Mukti**' is published every year which includes students' articles. This helps the students to reflect their talents, views in campus life, dynamism, and variety.
- 5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The placement cell of the college guides and encourages students about the small business to be opened and to become active

contributors to the nation's income. Commerce department conducts various programs by inviting businessmen, bankers and other experts in this connection. Department wise efforts are also made to help students to open and run small scale industries in various fields such as photography, horticulture, fish farming, pathology, dress making, mehendi preparation, rangoli design etc. Our efforts have produced results to some extent. Our Alumnus Kundan Meshram is running computer shop 'Chanda Computer'. Three ex-students from Commerce department established the limestone business. A certain percentage of our former students are self employed, some have opened pathological labs, some are professionally and scientifically managing agriculture and agro based production units. There are also female students who successfully run boutiques, beauty parlour, etc.

The institution has decided the policy to nurture and nourish the hidden talents of the students by conducting various sports events, cultural program, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. At the beginning of every academic session, the college invites the applications from students, who wish to participate in extracurricular activities such as Debate, Elocution and in other cultural activities. Many programmes are organized like debate, singing, dance, drama, essay writing and poster competitions during college annual day function.

Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations:

- Students with proven track record in sports and games are admitted under sports quota.
- Attendances of students are consider and are allowed to participate in different events.

- The College is ready to give students who distinguish in co-curricular events additional academic support to make up for the loss during competitions and training.
- Flexibility at college level exams is allowed, but not feasible for university examinations.

Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials:

- Special dietary instructions are given to the sports students so that they should maintain their health and fitness.
- Their medical checkup and physical efficiency test are carried out at regular interval.
- Huge ground facility is available.
- College provides the sports materials.
- Gymnasium facility is available.
- Habit of regular practice on different grounds.
- Uniform and kits are given free.
- Intense counseling to infuse the winning spirit.
- Special diet during matches

Any other: Special coaching and camps are arranged whenever necessary. College arranges bus/ railway concessions to students to participate in Inter-collegiate competition.


6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

- Each Faculty member has to submit PBAS proforma to the IQAC at the end of each academic session.
- Performance appraisal system is undertaken seriously by the staff, and it is evaluated by the Principal with the help of the Vice-Principal and senior faculty members.

- The Head of the Institute has formed a Screening Committee which evaluates, fills in the information and give necessary suggestions to the teachers.
- The Office head prepares the confidential report of non-teaching staff and it is verified by the Head of the institution.
- 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?
 - The IQAC evaluate the annual self-assessment proforma submitted by the faculty and the report is submitted to the Principal. The Principal communicates the evaluation report to the concerned employees with a suggestion for corrective measures.
 - The score sheet for academic performance indicator based on PBAS is considered for promotion under CAS.
 - Annual Self-Assessment proforma and confidential report of the staff members are submitted to parent society to consider the same for corrective measures if any.





Dr. Ambedkar College of Arts, Commerce and Science, CHANDRAPUR - 442 401, Maharashtra

PREAMBLE

Dr. Ambedkar College of Arts and Commerce, Chandrapur, Maharashtra, was established during 1970 by the Babasaheb Ambedkar Memorial Society, Chandrapur (Registered in 1967), when Departments of Commerce, Economics, English, History, Marathi, Pali and Prakrit, Political Science and Sociology were started. The Department of Geography was added during 1974, while 7 Departments of Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Electronics, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology were started during 1991. During 1998, the name of the College was changed to Dr. Ambedkar College of Arts, Commerce and Science. Recognition by the U. G. C. under 2f and 12B was obtained during 1989 and 1998, respectively. It is a Grant-in-aid College, affiliated to the Nagpur University, Nagpur. Its campus is spread in an area of 5 acres, located in urban/tribal surrounding. Chandrapur happens to be a major pilgrimage centre for the Buddhist community.

The mission of the College is integral formation of the human person for fulfilling the individual and social responsibilities with maturity. Goal of the Institution is also to foster the religious and cultural identity of the Buddhist community by the formation of its young men and women according to the ideals and teachings of Lord Buddha.

Out of the 17 Departments, carrying out teaching in Under-Graduate courses,

..... 1

three Departments of English, History and Sociology have been teaching the Post-Graduate students also. Teaching of Post-Graduate classes has also been started in the Departments of Botany, Zoology, Electronics, Mathematics, Economics, Marathi and Political Science from the 2003-04 academic session.

There are 29 permanent teachers, 29 Contributory teachers and 3 teachers on contract basis. Three teahers hold Ph. D. and 8 M. Phil. Degree. There are 23 men and 6 women permanent teachers; 3 men on contract basis; and 21 men and 8 women as contributory teachers.

Total number of Technical and Administrative staff is 6 and 30, respectively, out of whom two are women.

The College mainly caters to SC/ST/NT and Backward Caste students from the rural and tribal areas of the region. There are in all 2558 students -1947 Under-Graduate and 611 Post-Graduate students. 611 students are enrolled in the self-financing courses. There are two students from other states.

A Self-Study Report was submitted by the college to the N. A. A. C., Bangalore. In response to this request, the N. A. A. C. constituted a Peer Team, consisting of Professor Bhoomittra Dev, Former Vice-Chancellor, Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Gorakhpur University, Gorakhpur, and Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Rohilkhand university, Bareilly, as Chairman; and Professor K. C. Reddy, Professor and Honorary Director, centre for SARC, Andhra University, Waltair, Vishakapatnam - 530003, Andhra Pradesh, as Member Co-ordinator; and Dr. Nisha Tiwari, Principal, Govt. M. K. B. College for women, Jabalpur, M. P., as Member.

The Peer Team carefully read and analysed the Self-Study Report

submitted by the College prior to the visit. The Team visited the College for two days, i.e. August 9 and 10, 2004. It extensively interacted with the Principal and members of the Steering Committee, Governing Body, representative group of students and Parents and Alumini; visited the Departments on the campus; interacted with the teachers, students and employees; and examined various academic activities and support services. The Team also studied the co-curricular and extramural and extension programmes of the College; and validated the relevant available documents.

Based on the above exercise, and keeping in mind the seven criteria identified by the N. A. A. C., the Peer Team assessed the College for the quality of education, research and extension work. The assessment of the college on the seven criteria of the N. A. A. C. - framework and the issues of concern related to the criteria are presented in the sections below.

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Criteria. I - Curricular Aspects :

With a well formulated mission, Dr. Ambedkar College of Arts, Commerce and Science, Chandrapur, has designed various programmes of study within the framework, rules and guidelines provided by the Nagpur University to which it is affiliated to mould and equip the students with the skills and abilities to fulfill the individual and social responsibilities with maturity. The College has been specially focussing both in teaching and co-curricular activities on the ideals and teachings of Buddha, given the fact that a significant proportion of Buddhist community live in and around the area, where the Institution is located. The 17 Departments of the College offer 13 teaching programmes with limited range of options and flexibility in B. Sc., B. A. and B. Com. at the Under-Graduate and 10 at the Post-Graduate level. Post-Graduate programmes, started initially in English, Sociology and History in the institution were expanded later with the addition of programmes in Botany. Zoology, Electronics, Economics, Marathi, Political Science and Mathematics from the academic session 2003-04. All the Post-Graduate courses are self financing. Computer Sciences in B. Sc. and Communicative English in B. A. are the two Under-Graduate level programmes organised by the institution on self-financing basis. The college has earned an amount of Rs. 4.79 lakh during 2002-2003 through these programmes. The college has also designed few career oriented courses like communicative English in B. A., Computer Sciences and Electronics in B. Sc., and MIS and Information Technology in B. Com.

The Institution has been conducting orientation programmes to the students to motivate them towards value based education and to inculcate among

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them patriotism, discipline, civic sense and cleanliness. The college is having a system of annual self-appraisal by the faculty, which is studied by Peers and other authorities; and the result conveyed to the faculty.

Dr. Ambedkar college, together with the other colleges affiliated to the Nagpur University, has recently switched over to modular curricula after extensive discussion in the various academic bodies like Board of Studies, Faculty meetings, Subject Examination Committee etc. The college played an important role in restructuring the curricula. During 2003, a workshop on Evaluation Techniques and four interdisciplinary symposia were organized by the college. The Institution has a feed back mechanism from the students; and it is used to review and the design academic programmes. The various programmes of teaching and learning organized are consistent with the goals and objectives that were set for the Institution.

The faculty of the Institution have been serving as the Resource Persons, guest faculty, paper setters and moderators to the Nagpur university and other institutions. The College has also been organising educational tours, botanical exercises, study tours and guest lectures. The faculty are familiar with the modern teaching aids and internet facility.

Criteria. II - Teaching - Learning and Evaluation :

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The Institution has a transparent admission procedure, although it does not hold any special admission test. The total number of students in all programmes as on date is 2558 with about 40 percent being women students. Most of them come from the State of Maharashtra, except for two students from other states. The ratio between the applicants and the students admitted is 1:1 in most of the subjects. A few seats are reserved for widows and physically handicapped persons besides providing adequate representation to scheduled caste and schedule tribe students. About 53% of the students were from S. C., S. T. and O. B. C. during the last academic session. The drop-out rate of the students in most of the programmes is very high. The Institution works on an average for 180 days in an year and the teaching days are around 150. There are in all 61 teachers, 29 permanent, 29 contributory and 3 teachers on contract basis. Each teacher undertakes 15 hours of teaching per week; and for every full time teacher there is one part-time teacher. A number of vacancies were filled up with contributory staff recently. The ratio of permanent teachers and contributory teachers is nearly 1:1. The ratio of teaching to non-teaching staff is 1:0.5.

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The teaching and learning programmes, provided by the Institution, offer flexibility and help to bridge the gap among the learners. The programmes are monitored effectively through departmental meetings and in the faculty meetings. Year-wise teaching plans are drawn; and teachers do provide opportunity to the students to participate in discussion in the class room. The regular teaching programmes are supplemented with study tours and guest lectures.

The teachers are recruited on the basis of staff fixation rules of the Nagpur University where merit and motivation towards teaching are the important criteria.

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About 50 percent of teachers recruited recently are drawn from other institutions. The Institution has freedom to recruit faculty on temporary basis to meet emergencies and to suit the changing needs. The salary paid to the teachers is about 70 percent of the total budget for the college.

The Institution has evolved a mechanism in respect of evaluation of teaching and learning which is both transparent and participatory. The system of evaluation is the one that is followed by the University and it has been quite satisfactory.

The Institution also provides facilities and opportunities to the faculty for professional advancement and continued academic progress. Some seed money is provided to undertake minor research projects. A significant number of teachers participated in the national and international seminars. An amount of Rs. 20,000 was spent since 2000-01 to depute teachers to conferences and seminars. The Institution also conducts refresher courses and permits its teachers to attend refresher courses organized by other universities. The Institution encourages teachers to pursue research programmes including doctoral degrees or M. Phil. Teachers are permitted to utilise FIP facility. At present, one teacher is availing of the facility. There are three teachers in the College with Ph. D. and 8 with M. Phil. degrees. The teaching work is sharpened and strengthened organizing workshops and interdisciplinary seminars and symposia. The College has been organizing remedial classes; and an amount of Rs. 30,000 was spent by the college for the remedial classes since 2000-01.

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Criteria III - Research, Consultancy and Extension :

The general atmosphere in the Institution is congenial for teaching. There is also good potential for consultancy. The Institution has been encouraging the faculty as well as the students to publish in academic fora, although as on date the number of publications is very limited. One teacher is guiding ten part time research scholars in the Department of English. The UGC has sanctioned to the College an amount of Rs. 45,000 to organize a national level seminar on recent trends in Botany; and this programme is likely to be organised during December 2004. The Institution has a well planned and vigorous extension programme. The College has spent since 2000-01 Rs. 10,000 on extension activities. Students and staff participate very actively in various community development and socially relevant programmes. They include health and hygiene awareness, adult education, AIDS awareness, organising medical camp and blood donation and creating environmental awareness. The Institution encourages students to participate actively in NSS (150 students) and NCC (53 students) programmes implementing effectively the incentive of 10 marks provided by the Nagpur University. The Institution has been collaborating with various non-governmental organisations in Chandrapur for effective implementation of various extension activities. Staff and students of the College participate in the planning and implementation of Annual Dhamma Chhakra Anuvartan Day celebrations during 15th and 16th October.

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Criteria IV - Infrastructure and Learning Resources :

The College is spread over an area of 5 acres. The infrastructure includes, apart from the administrative block, a library, a swimming pool (under construction), a gymnasium hall (under construction), a computer centre, equipped departments, various sports fields and separate hostels for girls and boys. Although the boys hostel has provision for 10 rooms and girls hostel has 6 rooms both the hostels being unoccupied by the students.

The College maintains and augments its infrastructure with the help of funds provided from the U. G. C. - a sum of Rs. 79.07 lakh, out of which Rs. 39.63 lakh was for the construction of a swimming pool and Rs. 36.44 lakh for the gymnasium. The management share for the swimming pool and the Gymnasium hall was Rs. 19.81 lakh and Rs. 11.44 lakh respectively. These are yet to be completed.

There is a Nature Club in the College which helps to maintain cleanliness and beauty of the campus.

The College library remains open from 8.00 am till 5:30 pm daily. It has over 20214 books of which 1857 books are of the Junior college. In the year 2000-01, 616 books including journals, worth Rs. 85,465=00 were added to the central library. In the year 2001-02, 1157 books, worth Rs. 1,50,141/- were acquired. The amount sent on books and journals during 2003-04 is less than 1 percent of the college budget.

There is a book bank facility available in the central library. The library also has facilities like Internet, computers reprography, audio-video cassettes.

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The Departments of Mathematics, Electronics, Physics, Computer Science, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Commerce and Physical Education have computers of their own.

The College has a physical education centre which works from 6:30 a.m. till 6:30 p. m. The College has courts/playgrounds for various sports, viz. Basketball, Volleyball, Badminton, Handball, Football, Hockey, Cricket and Athletics. Gymnasium hall and Swimming pool are under construction. About 150 boys and 30 girls use the Gymnasium facilities regularly.

There is a specified sports quota for admission to various programmes run by the College. Under sports quota, 10 students were admitted in 2000-01 and 20 were admitted in the year 2001-02.

The outstanding sports persons get incentives like Certificates, Prizes, Momentoes, Shields and Cups.

The office of the 'Adult Education Programme' is also housed in the hostel.

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Criteria V - Students Support and Progression

In the year 2000-2001, out of 818 students admitted to the U. G. programme 321 appeared at the final examination, of which 184 passed. In the Post-Graduate programme, 418 students were admitted of which 120 appeared for the final examination.

In the year 2001-2002, out of 786 students admitted to the U. G. programme 389 appeared at the final examination, where as in the P. G. programme 310 students were admitted and 120 appeared for the final exam.

The dropout rates for U. G. programme for the year 2001-02 is about 50%. During the last 5 years, four students have qualified the U. G. C. - CSIR (NET) examination and two have qualified the State Public Service Examination.

The College publishes its updated prospectus annually. It includes the policies and criteria for admission into various courses.

Financial aid is provided to the students in the form of various scholarships, viz. merit scholarship, GOI, Scholarship for handicapped, Eklavya scholarship and National Scholarships. In the year 2003-04, scholarships worth Rs. 65.5 lakh were provided to the students belonging to different social groups. Some merit scholarships by GOI and scholarships for the handicapped are also provided.

The College has an Employment Cell and a Placement Officer who offers career counselling to the students. The teachers also participate in academic and personal counselling.

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During the last year, 18 U. G. students and 123 P. G. students were provided employment in Private as well as Public sector undertakings through the Placement Cell of the College. Apart from these, the Employment Cell motivated 120 students to seek self-employment.

The College has an Alumni Association. The Association is governed by a committee comprising of the Principal, teachers and some of the former students. The Alumni Association meeting is held twice a year.

Recreational facilities like Indoor games, Nature Club, Students Magazine, Audio-video facility, Outdoor games, Debate Clubs, Cultural Programmes and Dance-music competition are made available to the students.

The College also has a Population Club, which has undertaken survey in nearby villages of Durgapur and Phutala. It has also staged plays for bringing awareness.

In the year 2003-04, 150 students were enrolled in the Adult Education Programme scheme, with the aim : 'Each one Teach one'.

The college has made arrangements for providing the services of a physician as and when required.

The College has a canteen with separate provision for teachers as well as students.

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Criteria VI - Organisation and Management :

The College has an internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism. The Governing Body, through the Principal, monitors the College administration.

Through confidential reports, reviews, discussions and supervision, it also checks the work-efficiency of the non-teaching staff.

The Time-Table committee of the College prepares the academic calendar, as per University guidelines.

The College has initiated professional development programmes for the non-teaching staff. Three members of the non-teaching have been trained in computer operation, under this programme.

The fee structure for U. G. programme which includes the Tution fee, library fee, laboratory fee and others is Rs. 1523/-. For P. G. programme, it is Rs. 1923/

-. There has been no change in the fee-structure during the last three years.

The 'Unit-cost' of College education is Rs. 5793/-.

During the last two years, the College had a deficit budget.

The College has an internal audit mechanism.

Under welfare programmes, the College extends loan facility to the staff through the Employees Credit Society which sanctions emergency as well as general loans.

The College also runs a Book Bank for providing help to the poor students.

The College also has a grievance redressal cell. The committee meetings are held, on and when required, to deal with the grievances of the employees and others.

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Criteria VII - Healthy Practices :

* It is commendable that the College has made higher education affordable for the poor students, especially the tribal and weaker sections of the society. Such an affirmative action has been received very well in the region.

* It is good that the administration has generally succeeded in maintaining harmarious relations between different stake-holders on the campus.

* The College has also done good extension work, especially by the Adult Education, Population club, NCC.

* Value based education is imparted through extension activities like N. S. S. and N. C. C. To inculcate civic responsibilities among the students, the College organizes programmes like Blood donation camps, Tree Plantation and Environmental awareness camp.

* The Departments of English, Marathi, Geography and Pali & Prakrit have contributed significantly.

* The College provides inter-departmental, inter-faculty activities for the students.

Areas of Concern and Suggetions :-

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* Despite the fact that the number of contributory teachers is very high in relation to that of the permanent teachers, the College has chosen to open Postgraduate classes in as many as 10 subjects. This needs further strengthening urgently.

* There is space-crunch for several Departments.

* Both the senior and Junior colleges are functioning in the same building.

* Drop-out and failure rates are generally very high. The College should

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consider having remedial measures to ensure that the poor and weak students are served well to fulfill in mission and vision.

* The College may consider re-vitalizing the central library, which should play a significant pro-active role in accelerating flow of more information and knowledge to the end-users.

* The College should lay more emphasis on research-activities. Potentiality of many of the teachers has not been fully exploited. The Management may provide more seed-money for creative activities; and encourage submission of suitable research projects to various funding agencies. The laboratories also need immediate development.

* Running of the Department of Computer Science in the basement requires a fresh look.

* Both the hostels for boys and girls need be occupied by the students.

* Incomplete buildings from the IX plan period may urgently be taken care

of.

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* It will be good for the College if the Grievance Redressal Mechanism are made more transparent and participative.


